The Australian Ambassador to Indonesia, Mr Roderick Brazier, visited AIS Jakarta on Tuesday, accompanied by Ms Milisa McDowall, Counsellor (Management) and Consul from the Australian Embassy.

During his tour, Ambassador Brazier spent time in a number of classrooms, including Year 10 Science, other high school classes, several primary and preschool rooms, and the Year 6 STEM and Robotics class. A highlight for younger students was his reading of *The Wobbly Bike* picture book to the Year 1 and 2 classes.



This term, Year 6 EAL students have been exploring the features of short stories. They began by reading and viewing *The Three Little Pigs and the Wolf*, which they analyzed using a plot diagram to better understand narrative structure. Through this, they identified key elements: the exposition (characters, setting, and problem), the rising action (events that build suspense), the climax (the story's turning point), the falling action (where events begin to resolve), and the resolution (how the problem is solved).



Building on this understanding, students applied their creativity by modifying the original tale and developing their own unique versions. They showed imaginative thinking in planning, writing, and illustrating their stories, while also practicing the use of descriptive language to engage readers.





The students recently completed their own creative retellings of *The Three Little Pigs*. Their stories had imaginative titles such as *The Three Little Fatty Pigs and the Mean Fox*, *The Hardworking Boo*, *One Clever Pig Teaches the Two Pigs*, *Three Little Pigs and the Anaconda*, *The Three Little Pigs Chased by the Wolf*, *The 3 Little Generous Pigs and the Big Bad Wolf*, *The Three Pigs and a Bull*, and *The Third Pig Survives*.



As part of the publishing stage, students carefully edited their work and chose to present their final stories either as a book or a poster. To enhance their presentations, they used Canva to design their writing, adding visual elements that made their work both creative and professional. The completed pieces were then shared with others, allowing students to showcase not only their writing skills but also their creativity and design flair.

**PAWS Vet Experience** 



On Saturday 9th of August, some of the Primary PAWS members went to PAWPPY in Kemang to help castrate an AIS cat. As Tibby had already turned 6 months old, it was time to get him neutered to ensure he could not reproduce, leading to more stray cats.

First we helped Dr Arlina Sarah cut Tibby's nails so he could not scratch. Next, a head covering was placed on Tibby to prevent him biting and to calm him down. We also weighed him to see how much anesthetic he needed. In the operating room, Adept helped the vet to shave Tibby so that it was easier to operate on him. Madison then helped to sedate the patient with an injection. Tibby was very restless and Imogen observed that it took a few doses of sedative before he finally succumbed.

Dr Sarah then used a sharp knife to operate on Tibby. Aisyah watched in awe of the vet's skills but she found it to be a bit confronting, as did the other students. Lana felt a little queasy and decided to leave the operating theatre to play with some of the dogs waiting to be groomed.

Once the operation was complete, the students helped to fit a cone on Tibby to make sure he did not lick the wound. We then moved him onto the floor from the operating table to make sure he was safe when he woke up. A few days later he returned to AIS with antibiotics to prevent infection.

Tibby has now made a full recovery and is enjoying life back at the North Campus.

PAWS students encourage you to be a responsible pet owner and make sure your domestic animal visits the vet regularly for the right care. PAWPPY is a great choice as it has a vet, grooming centre, hotel, pool and shop.

Stay tuned for the next PAWS and PAWPPY collaboration in October when the students will groom Miss Susan's standard poodle and toy poodle at the salon under the supervision of the caring PAWPPY staff.

Year 6 Guest Speaker - Mr William Wright



Year 6 welcomed Mr William Wright (Maya's dad), who works in media and communications at RMIT University in Australia. Otherwise known as the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology, RMIT is a large public university in Melbourne, Australia, well known for its focus on technology, design, engineering, media, and innovation. Will shared how he helps scientists turn their research into stories for TV, radio, and programs like Behind the News.

Students were fascinated by his story of the coffee concrete project in Gisborne, Victoria, where waste coffee grounds were used to build the world's first footpath of its kind. His talk highlighted how science and storytelling together can spark change in the real world, linking back to RMIT's strategy of Knowledge with Action.

Some reflections from students after the talk included the following -

"I couldn't believe coffee could turn into concrete - that was amazing!"

"The idea of stopping sewer fatbergs sounded gross but really cool!"

"It was interesting to see how the media can help science change the world."

Will also shared his education journey with the students, informing them that although he actually studied Arts and Law at university, his real passion was in storytelling, leading him to a career in media. He reminded students that they may not know what they want to do when leaving school and that it might take some time exploring different fields until they find their perfect career.

The results of the tests are used by departments as part of our focus on becoming a more data literate school, using the evidence from the data to develop our data stories about the students we teach and the lessons we prepare.

On Tuesday we welcomed the new Australian Ambassador to school. He met with representatives of the SRC, Eoghann, Yunji and Fathima, and they showed him around some of the classes on the 4th floor. He got to learn about pendulums, joining Year 10 for their Science practical.

 On Thursday we will have a High School assembly from 0910 in the MPC. You are very welcome to come and join us.



# **ANBK SMP (Asesmen Nasional Berbasis Komputer)**

ANBK replaces the former National Examinations, which were discontinued in 2019. This assessment is an important requirement for students to obtain their National Certificate, which they will receive upon completing Year 9.

# **Year 11 IBDP Environmental Systems & Societies**

This week, our Environmental Systems and Societies (ESS) class took part in a hands-on lab simulation to better understand the concept of the *Tragedy of the Commons*—the tension between the common good and the needs of the individual, and how these can often come into conflict.



Using simple materials from the pantry, students worked in groups to "fish" from a shared ocean filled with chocolate candies. Some candies represented common fish, while others represented high-value fish that brought in greater rewards. The challenge was to collect enough to survive while also leaving enough in the ocean for future rounds.

Very quickly, students discovered that if everyone took as much as they could, the shared resource collapsed. The activity illustrated why, when a resource is seen as belonging to everyone, it is often exploited—since the individual benefit outweighs the cost, which is spread across the entire community. This assumes humans act selfishly, and it shows why regulation and limits are sometimes needed to ensure sustainability.

Through this playful but thought-provoking activity, students reflected on the importance of collaboration, prediction, and long-term thinking. They also considered their own roles as stakeholders in real-world environmental issues on how our everyday choices affect common resources.
