### **NAPLAN**

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual assessment for students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. This year it will take place here in Jakarta from Monday 24th – Thursday 28th March (last week of Term 1 = Week 9).

NAPLAN is a nationwide measure through which parents/carers, teachers, schools, education authorities, governments and the broader community can determine whether or not young Australians are developing the literacy and numeracy skills that provide the critical foundation for other learning and for their productive NAPLAN tests are one aspect of each school's assessment and reporting process and do not replace the extensive, ongoing assessments made by teachers about each student's performance. Each teacher will have the best insight into their students' educational progress. Parents/carers can use NAPLAN reports, along with other school assessment reports, to discuss their child's strengths and areas for improvement with their teacher.

NAPLAN results do not measure overall school quality.

NAPLAN is made up of tests in the 4 areas of:

- reading
- writing
- conventions of language (spelling, grammar and punctuation)
- Numeracy.

NAPLAN results allow parents/carers and educators to see how students are progressing in literacy and numeracy over time – individually, as part of their school community, and against national standards.

The tests support monitoring and evaluating the performance of schools and school systems in these fundamental capabilities. They also provide schools, states and territories with information about how education approaches are working, areas to be prioritised for improvement, and those schools requiring support in the teaching and learning of literacy and numeracy.

The best preparation for NAPLAN is teaching and learning the curriculum. Children can be reassured that NAPLAN tests are just one part of their school program, and they should simply do the best they can on the day.

#### Year 1 EAL

During the first half of this term, our Year 1 EAL students have been exploring characters in stories and developing their understanding of storytelling. They have listened to and read well-known folk tales such as *Jack and the Beanstalk, Little Red Riding Hood, The Three Little Pigs,* and *Goldilocks and the Three Bears.* 



As they engaged with these stories, the students examined key character traits and practiced describing them in their own words. ## Year 9 Geography & Science Field Trip: Exploring Human Impact in Sentul

On February 27, 2025, Year 9 students traveled to Sentul for an immersive Geography and Science field trip, exploring how human activity impacts natural environments. Linked to their Biomes and Global Systems units, the trip provided real-world insights into farming, forestry, and land use management.

Upon arrival, students were welcomed by idGuides experts, who introduced them to the natural environment and local ecosystems before they set off in groups to examine water features, wildlife, and human land use. Partway through the trek, heavy rain turned the trails to mud, leading to some slips and slides, but the experienced guides—all local farmers—kept everyone safe. Despite the challenge, students embraced the adventure, making it back to base camp wet and muddy, where a delicious meal awaited them.

The day concluded with reflection on their learning, including discussions on ecotourism—as the funds from their excursion support the local community. This hands-on experience deepened students' understanding of land use, resource management, and environmental change, making classroom learning come to life. Year 7 students enthusiastically engage in the art-making process, and we share their excitement.



These activities serve as a strong foundation, encouraging students to observe closely, refine eye-hand coordination, and explore value without the pressure of perfection.
